PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Parishioners,

Our lives are sacred stories composed of sacred stories. We've been fed, cared for, protected, forgiven and redeemed. We love telling the stories of it all, again and again: the moment we met our spouse, the day our child was born, the chance meeting that changed our lives, the times we've heard God's voice. These sacred stories are full of meaning, loaded with good news, and we keep reflecting on them and telling them again because there is always more to savor and discover.



At Mass, we listen to sacred stories from the Scriptures. We listen to stories of creation and liberation, stories of sin and redemption, stories of healing and resurrection. We hear words that have inspired the human family, especially those in the Christian tradition, for centuries. Words that teach, encourage, challenge and inspire, stories that tell us who we are, who God is, and how salvation is unfolding through divine initiative and our response.

There is a three-year cycle of readings for Sunday liturgies, Cycles A, B and C. The first and second readings vary from Sunday to Sunday, but the Gospel is fixed, for the most part, according to the particular cycle. Cycle A offers the Gospel of Matthew, Cycle B offers Mark and Cycle C offers Luke's Gospel. We hear a section of John's Gospel in Cycle B since the Gospel of Mark is shorter than the other two, and we hear the Gospel of John in the Easter Season.

After standing through the Gathering Rite and the Penitential Rite, we are seated for the Liturgy of the Word, ready to listen to the story of God's saving action. A Lector proclaims the first reading from the Ambo. Lectors are trained in proclamation of the word, but are also encouraged to pray with the word and live the word. And as the word is proclaimed, we believe Christ is really present, teaching, instructing and guiding us. The first reading is typically taken from the Old Testament (also referred to as the Hebrew Scriptures) and connects thematically to the Gospel of the day. During the Easter Season, the first reading is taken from the New Testament, primarily Acts of the Apostles. As the first reading is announced and proclaimed, we listen not just to a story from history, but to a story that tells us about our lives today. The Lector concludes the reading with "The Word of the Lord," to which the Assembly responds, "Thanks be to God."

After some silence, the Cantor approaches the Ambo to serve as Psalmist, intoning the refrain, inviting the Assembly to respond and chanting the verses. The Psalm refrain articulates the Scriptural theme of the day succinctly and beautifully. We use the term "Responsorial Psalm" in reference to the format, the Psalm being sung in a responsorial fashion (call and response). I always find this one of the most prayerful moments of the liturgy. The Psalms are full of human experience: need, wonder, awe, struggle, questioning, thanksgiving. And the Psalms express God's saving love with poetic beauty and power.

After some silence, a Lector proclaims the second reading, taken from one of the New Testament books (Christian Scriptures). We hear from the same book for several Sundays in a row, thus establishing some continuity in lessons from week to week. The second reading is usually an exhortation written to one of the early Christian communities, teaching, encouraging, correcting, affirming. And the message addressed to them is usually just as relevant to us today. The Lector introduces and concludes the reading just as the First Lector does, with the Assembly responding "Thanks be to God."

As we are seated, the homilist's task and privilege is to connect the readings, especially the Gospel, to the experience of contemporary human beings, to invite the Assembly to discover our own call to conversion, the abundance of divine mercy and grace, and the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the midst of our stories. A good homily can also contain some teaching and catechesis, affirmation of the faith journey of the Assembly and some invitation to change. It is best followed by silence. A homiletics instructor in the seminary told us once that "The homily begins when the homilist stops talking." It's not the task of a homily to say it all. It's simply to open the door and invite the Assembly to reflect on Scripture, faith and daily life.

Following the homily, all stand for the Profession of Faith. We typically recite the Nicene Creed, professing with one voice what we hold dear. I always find it so powerful to be surrounded by people speaking the same words and the same faith. As one body, we strengthen one another. And even if we struggle to believe or understand some of what we profess, our profession is a commitment to wrestling with this faith so as to come to deeper understanding.

We proceed next to the Prayer of the Faithful in which we offer general prayers for the human family. The Roman Missal invites us to pray for the needs of the church, for public authorities, for those burdened by any kind of difficulty and for the local community. We also pray for the sick and for those who have died. And while not required, we announce the specific intention of the Mass. The Prayer of the Faithful is introduced by the priest with a brief invitation. A lector speaks the prayers and invites the response of the Assembly, thus continuing the call and response. The priest concludes the prayer, all are seated and we proceed to the Preparation of the Altar, thus initiating the transition to the Liturgy of the Eucharist.



VISITATION REFUGEE ASSISTANCE COMMITTEE (August 2025)

We want to thank everyone who has contributed furniture, household items and money for our refugee efforts. The committee has been busy collecting furniture and household items, assisting with medical and dental appointments, enrolling in schools and assisting with green card applications.

We are working with three refugee families: the Contreras family from Honduras, and the Kachumba and Amuri families, both originally from Democratic Republic of Congo, but more recently from Nyarugusu refugee camp in Tanzania.

The Contrerases and their four young children moved to a new apartment closer to Visitation, where the father,

Miguel, now works as a school custodian. Please say hello when you see him in the halls of Visitation! Miguel is learning English and is a very hard worker. The mother, Karla, is studying for the driver's license and hopes to find a job in the months ahead. In the meantime, the committee is assisting with babysitting and transportation to and from numerous health appointments.

Since 2023, our team has been assisting the large Kachumba family with all aspects of life in America. The patriarch and matriarch, Awaya and Lusia, have seven living adult children. Two daughters and their children currently live with Awaya and Lusia, along with one adult son who moved in with them last year. One daughter and her children recently moved from their house to Kentucky and another son lives in Lawrence, Kansas. Two additional daughters and their children are still in the refugee camp in Tanzania. Awaya and Lusia are Catholic and enjoy attending Mass at Visitation. Transportation and learning English are the biggest challenges for the Kachumba adults, but three adults are employed. The kids are doing well and learning English at an amazing pace. We will be assisting three school age kids with school supplies and clothes in the next few weeks.

The newest addition to our refugee family is Asende Amuri, mother of 5, who came to the US in 2016 but only recently moved to Kansas City. She is Awaya Kachumba's niece and moved to KC from Michigan for a job opportunity at a manufacturer in Parkville. Visitation members helped furnish her two-bedroom apartment near Independence Ave. We are working actively to help her with pediatric appointments, school enrollment and monthly household needs. She is gracious and so thankful for our assistance.

The challenges that these families face can be daunting, but their resilience and enduring hope for the future is inspiring. Walking hand-in-hand with all of them as they transition to life in the United States has been an amazing experience for our team - and only possible due to the generosity of our Visitation community. Thank you again - and please don't hesitate to reach out to us with questions or ideas.


