



RACIAL JUSTICE



The Racial Justice Committee will host a discussion on <u>Facing</u> <u>Georgetown's History: A Reader on</u> <u>Slavery, Memory and</u> <u>Reconcilation</u>, edited by Adam Rothman and Elsa Barrazza Mendoza, on **Tuesday, June 10 at 7:00 pm** in the Retreat Room. RJC members David Bruegging and Linda Hughes will lead the discussion of this collection of



essays. Past Just Faith participants and all parishioners will have the opportunity to learn a more full version of the Catholic church's complicity with slavery, and the reconciliation process planned and implemented by Georgetown Jesuit leaders. Facilitators will also provide an update on the reconciliation process at Georgetown.

CRISTO REY INTERNS

Visitation's Racial Justice Committee began a collaborative initiative in 2021 that has allowed the parish and school to work together in order to bring four Cristo Rey High School students to work as interns at Visitation School. Over 117 parishioners have made contributions (\$9,000 per student this coming year) to make this happen.

Each year we review the initiative. To date, all who are involved - parish and school leaders, involved faculty, donor parents and the committee who initiated this collaboration (VIS RJC) - support the continuation of the Cristo Rey intern program at Visitation School.

As we have contacted past donors to thank them for their support, we continue to hear good things including this statement from parishioner Katie Wendel:

"It is my pleasure to support Cristo Rey through my contribution to Visitation. Having been involved with CR for many years (even Dancing with the Stars) I believe in the importance of the CR students to be involved in the community outside of their comfort zone and have witnessed firsthand the growth that occurs. By supporting this endeavor at Visitation, I believe it is a wonderful learning experience that crosses boundaries and creates acceptance and respect for both groups of students."

We are grateful for the support of so many parishioners - school parents as well as many from the larger parish community - and look forward to another successful year.

REDEMPTORIST- PRESENTATION ON BLESSED STANLEY ROTHER

On Monday, June 9 at 7:00 pm, Redemptorist will host Fr. Don Wolf, a priest from the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City, who will speak about Blessed Stanley Rother. Fr. Rother was martyred in 1981 in Guatemala where he was serving as a missionary in Santiago Atitlan. In 2015, the Vatican formally recognized him as a martyr. He was beatified in 2017 in Oklahoma City. Blessed Stanley Rother is the first martyr from the United States and the first U.S.-born priest to be beatified. Fr. Wolf is a cousin to Blessed Stanley Rother and will speak in the Garden Room at Redemptorist.

VISITATION CELEBRATES STEWARDSHIP AND SERVICE

Following our all-school Mass, Visitation held its annual End-of-Year Stewardship Assembly to honor students for their outstanding commitment to serving others. Students in grades K-4 were recognized for completing over 25 hours of stewardship, while students in grades 5-8 were celebrated for contributing more than 50 hours.

A highlight of the assembly was the presentation of the Becca Lueke Award to 8th graders David Colombo and Lila Gaarder, honoring their exceptional dedication to service and leadership.

The Visitation Junior Board also announced this year's grant recipients, awarding a total of \$9,500 to local nonprofit organizations:

\$1,000 each to Veterans Community Project, The Rabbit Hole, and Ronald McDonald House; \$1,500 to Kanbe's Markets; \$2,000 to Welcome House; \$2,500 to KC Mothers in Charge.

The Junior Board is a student-led foundation of 7th and 8th graders who partner with area nonprofits through hands-on service. Students research organizations, volunteer their time, and present their work for the chance to earn grant funding to support the missions they believe in.

Stewardship is a core pillar of life at Visitation, and the Junior Board exemplifies this value in action. We are incredibly proud of all our students for their dedication to helping others—and congratulations to the Junior Board teams who earned grants to support these worthy organizations!

EASTER AND EARTH DAY ACTIVITIES, 10TH ANNIVERSARY OF POPE FRANCIS' LETTER "LAUDATO SI", AND POPE LEO XIV

EASTER 2025 was April 20. EARTH DAY 2025 was April 22. Catholics connected their lives to the Resurrection event and to the irreplaceable role of Hope in their lives in celebrating Easter and then called on hope again on Earth Day almost immediately after. The importance of Easter was not confined to April 20, nor was the importance of Earth Day confined to April 22. Here are specific examples.



Climate GKC, the voluntary civic council that links Greater Kansas City to the national environmental movement, convened leading business, elected government and private business leaders to their **4th Climate Action KC summit**, on Saturday, April 5 at the Unity Temple on the Plaza. The agenda was to evaluate where the GKC climate control effort stood in the light of contemporary national governmental actions intended to destabilize the climate control movement. Local leaders indicated they saw the need to continue the control of carbon emissions and not to be thrown off their course of previously planned actions to meet climate control levels locally. The climate control movement in our hometown area needs to stay alive per its leaders.

At various times and dates before and after Earth Day, over a dozen environmentally focused local agencies offered sessions updating issues, e.g., limiting the use of plastics, taking a critical look at the efficiencies and inefficiencies of recycling glass, paper and metals, lessening food waste, composting, using smarter shopping practices and protecting natural environments.

As an example of action at **a parish level, St Thomas More** invited parishioners and neighboring parishes to view the film "We are all plastic people now" (available on You Tube) followed by discussion. As a practical matter, they distributed a handout on seven "smart alternatives to plastic wrap for a healthier kitchen." Participants at the meeting reflected that our society needs now to deal with single-use plastics the way society has learned to reduce smoking tobacco. Plastics make up an oversized amount of the pollution threatening our water bodies and now plastic particles are showing up in the blood streams of our own bodies.

The **Catholic Climate Covenant** organization marked Earth Day by creating a workshop that could be used on Earth Day-or on similar occasions focused on care of the earth (See "**Earth Day program**" at catholicclimatecovenant.org). It includes a "facilitator's guide" that would be helpful for anyone working with a small group or using the program as a private learning experience, along with suggestions for opening and closing prayers, and four appropriate readings for reflection and discussion. The commentary also reminded us that Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato Si", "the most influential statement ever written about our current environmental crisis," is always valuable in such discussions. The authors added the reminder that "the United States is historically the largest contributor to conditions creating climate change and still has the highest per-capita emission of any other country."

Earth Day, continued.

Relevant to the Easter season and Earth Day, the CCC also highlighted a keynote address by Joseph Tyson, Bishop of Yakima, WA, on Pope Francis' Vision for Ecology. The theme was **the inner connectedness of human ecology, creation and the common good.** Bishop Tyson pointed out that "the study of salvation is not about escaping the world but about rescuing and redeeming it." Social and environmental issues are interconnected. "The



idea of redemption involves not just human salvation but the liberation of all creation... This principle urges us to care for both the planet and the people, especially the marginalized as part of God's redemptive plan."

In its Earth Day mailing, the **Sierra Club** reflected that over the past 50 years Earth Day has multiple times been a catalyst for transformation: e.g., clean water, clean air, lessening pollution. What started in local communities ended creating a national impact through national legislation. The message this year is the continued need to resist the fossil fuel industry and fight back against government administrative actions reversing the progress of the past decade. "In short, they (the current national administration) are putting our forests and rivers, our prairies and streams, our oceans and costal habitats at urgent risk... We can and will defend the natural places we love... Never give up!"

Following the exciting event of the papal conclave, **Pope Leo XIV** has already indicated on several occasions that he has been and will be continuing to follow the initiative of Pope Francis to protect the earth through an "integral ecology." In an address to the Pontifical Commission for Latin America prior to his election, he concluded, "in the case of the ecological crisis, it is time to move from words to action." Don't be surprised if in late May or this coming December, on the **10th anniversary of Pope Francis' encyclical letter Laudato Si**, Pope Leo XIV will be adding his own positive words encouraging our spiritual practices of deep gratitude to our Father/Creator of this wonderful world and for increased care of our only common home.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT

Alexandra's House

On April 28, 1997, Alexandra's House was founded as a non-profit corporation with its purpose being expressed as a baby hospice, for the term "perinatal hospice" had not yet been characterized. Initially the mission was



operated from a private home until it moved into a larger space to accommodate families, and was supported by the founder's personal income until 2003. The first baby was referred to the home in 1999 and now Alexandra's House operates full-time, in person and also online, by phone, whatever is needed, to serve families and their dying babies for free.
