A LITTLE VISITATION

Dear People of Visitation,

This morning I was ruminating over in my prayer/tv watching/banjo practice/reading/homily writing/dining room over what to write you today. These recent days are a welcome luxury for this time of year very suddenly presents a less busy way of life. That is nice. However, summertime circumstances leave me scratching my head over bulletin letter topics. As I sat there today reflecting on this, it suddenly occurred to me that maybe you would enjoy knowing something about diocesan priest assignments and how they are done. This is the time of year when they are announced, so they are on folks' mind some. By the way, in our diocese they are usually effective on the first day of July.

We have no clergy assignments that directly affect Visitation this year. You folks are apparently saddled with me for another year. If that suits you fine, I share your satisfaction. If that disappoints you, don't worry. I have been around here long enough that whatever time I have left is almost certainly a lot shorter than the time I have already served. In another 365 days, it will be interesting to see where we are with it. Clergy assignments are rather interesting every year, especially to the clergy and parishes subject to a change.

Between seminary and ordained life, I have been at this work for 44 years. As I reflect on it, a fair amount has changed over all that time in the way priest assignments are done. When you get right down to it, the most salient factor in Catholic priest assignments is the diocesan bishop. When I was contemplating the seminary, we had an old and saintly bishop here named Charles Helmsing. Bishop Helmsing was truly a holy man. Maybe he was a wise one too. In any case, back in those days he had the luxury of leaving capable priests in parishes for a long time, and he often did. But Bishop Helmsing retired in 1977 and a new man came to town named Bishop John Sullivan. As the years have rolled on, I have come to think that Bishop Sullivan was also a rather saintly man. Oh, back in the day, I often thought he was mistaken in a lot of the things he said and did, but as the seasons accrued, he has looked more insightful every day. Perhaps he was ahead of his time. Anyway, Bishop Sullivan really shook up the priest assignment situation in our diocese, turning over a lot of parish apple carts. He was trying to shake some younger talent to the top of the diocesan pastoral apparatus and he had some success, and suffered some failure. He was urgent about it. Here is an anecdote that is hard to believe: I remember getting a letter in the mail in the Bishop Sullivan days announcing that all diocesan priests had to submit their retirement at age 65 and that it would be up to the Bishop to accept or reject it! Today that would be slightly less likely to happen than Santa Claus coming down your chimney on the Fourth of July.

In the Bishops Boland, Finn, and Johnston years, the diocesan priest talent pool has gotten much older and smaller. Despite that, the herd still has to be regularly culled for all kinds of legal, moral and performance issues. So in any given year, the diocesan bishop, and the Priest Personnel Board (a group of priests the Bishop uses to advise him on clergy assignments), are confronted with a lot of needs and comparatively few ways to satisfy them. Larger parishes are generally given the most proven pastors the diocese has available. Smaller places are often given priests of little, and even very little, pastoral experience. The dice is sometimes rolled. And, sometimes it works out well and sometimes it does not. It is an increasingly tough situation because there are fewer and fewer priests, whatever their respective abilities. You might say, "Well, why doesn't the diocese entrust parishes to lay people?" Fair question. I can tell you from long experience that there are very few lay people equipped with experience or interest to do the job either. I think in the future you will see more parishes closed, combined and under the administrative direction of permanent deacons for at this point we have more of them on active duty than we do priests. Their number escalates. They are younger. The priest population continues to age and decline in number. Places like Visitation (Is there really any place like Visitation?) will almost certainly be among the very last to come under the direction of a non-priest. But the way things are going, even places like ours could someday see the pastor charged with duty at more than one parish, with more purely administrative functions fully assigned to a lay person(s). It is a foggy, cloudy future and the clouds promise storms. Maybe even some severe ones.

A LITTLE VISITATION (CONTINUED)

There are more than a few people at the diocese and in Visitation who counsel me to do more to promote priest vocations in this parish. I am not unsympathetic to that, but I am not at all sure how to do it. Gathering what I think I know about priest-vocation promotion efforts by my immediate predecessors, I think they shared my befuddlements. Just speaking for myself, I think the vocation of priest is primarily a life of service to God through the people of the parish. It certainly can be personally rewarding. It is a noble way to live if it is lived with integrity.

But, to me, its wonder and treasures are things that are more assuredly “caught” rather than “taught.” Raising interest in the priesthood is a long-term, uneven and mostly untestable process. If I am right about that, maybe Bishop Charles Helmsing’s long-term priest assignment philosophy made the most sense in terms of incubating priest vocations, would that it were feasible today. Generally, I do not think it is as feasible today as it once was. And that brings us full circle.

There is a group in our diocese called the Serra Club. One of their primary missions is to promote priest and religious vocations. Recently they have contacted me about beginning a program here to generate interest among younger people in priesthood and religious community life. As I learn more about that program, I will explain its particulars. Until then, I ask you to be open to fostering priestly and religious vocations in your family. Aye, it is not an easy life. But chances are the one you are living and modeling is not so easy either. Can a distinctly Christian life ever be easy?

Congratulations on your Engagement! Visitation welcomes you into the marriage preparation process that will enrich and equip you to experience a joy-filled marriage. Visitations engaged couples who are preparing for marriage are guided in an insightful and life-giving marriage preparation process. Our process helps form essential marriage tools and establish a closer connection with our parish community. The Diocese of Kansas



City-St. Joseph sets the expectation that engaged couples will notify parishes at least nine months in advance of their weddings in order to participate fully in preparation for the sacrament of marriage. Over the years our parish community has learned this and, without exception, contacts the parish as soon as they are engaged. For the most part people have to do that in order to get the church and reception site dates lined up well in advance of nine months. More recently, couples who are going “home” (out of Kansas City) to be married have contacted the parish three – six months before their weddings which does not allow adequate time. REDLINED: CITIES, SUBURBS AND SEGREGATION

The Visitation Racial Justice Committee invites you to explore Kansas City's history of redlining - in a new exhibit at the Johnson County Arts & Heritage Center. REDLINED uses artifacts from the Johnson County Museum, State Historical Society of Missouri, and more than 20 other institutions, to show how our region was shaped by the federal policy.

Redlining refers to the systematic disinvestment of some neighborhoods and populations in favor of others, most often based on race. It meant that private industry and, later, the federal government chose to fund and support home purchases for white families and white neighborhoods over African American families and communities of color. The policy was outlawed by the 1968 Civil Rights Act, but legacies of redlining continue to impact communities of color.

The exhibit pulls content from more than 120 books, articles and dissertations, as well as thousands of primary-source documents housed at regional and national archives. An art exhibit within the exhibit features works from the African American Artists Collective (aaackc.org) - providing a chance to reflect on the history and legacies of redlining from different perspectives.




